

It has historically been used as a wild play space by children in the neighbourhood with evidence of the past existence of an informal rope swing. The space is entered through a swinging gate at the end of a lane that would only be discovered by people living in local homes. It has interesting historic architecture embedded in the green space, including a stone half circle like an animal pen and a wall that appears to have formed part of the larger estate around Abbotfield Hall.</p>	
	<p><b>The site should not be an extensive tract of land.</b> How large is the site in comparison to the community it serves and areas of land in the vicinity?</p> <p><i>Please provide justification below:</i></p> <p>The site is 0.03 Ha within a total parish area of 1,330 Ha. The site is similar in size to many pocket parks in new developments. It invites visitors to engage in play and is relatively shielded from detection.</p>

This is also enhanced by the architectural elements of the half circle and the stone wall.</p>	Y

For example, listed buildings, scheduled ancient monuments, and war memorials.</p> <p><i>Please provide justification below</i></p> <p>Abbotsfield Hall was built for Mr Thomas Morris the managing director of the Devon Great Consuls Mining Company  He was the relative ( brother possibly uncle) of the eminent Victorian designer, craftsman and poet William Morris  The hall was subsequently owned by the Price family of candle makers fame  Used by the British army then the Americans during the war in 1946 it housed 350 German prisoners  It was where General Eisenhower met Field Marshall Montgomery in 1944 to plan the invasion of Normandy the House/ Hall displays a plaque to commemorate the occasion.  In 1948 it was bought by the Urban District Council for £5000 and used as a youth hostel until 1982. In 1984 it was sold for £105,000 and became a residential home.  There is a rather fine wall mural in the hall painted in the 1950's by the Tavistock Group of artists depicting Tavistock it was in recent years made into a jigsaw puzzle and sold by THT.</p>	Y
