

	The site, as detailed above, is now covered by maturing trees and wild meadow and scrub. As it currently exists, the site therefore provides a carbon store. It provides necessary shade (and a cooling effect). Significantly, the site is on a steep slope, and the surface roughness of the	
	vegetation is of great value for trapping and slowing the flow of runoff and	

	therefore contributes to flood attenuation (see the work of the Westcountry Rivers Trust on Rapid Response Catchments).

	The 'Trendle' meadow, whilst not publicly accessible, is of significant historic importance for the town of Tavistock and its people. The earthwork itself is a scheduled monument but the rest of the field in which it lies is likely to have associated archaeological value as part of the Trendle landscape. The site is now almost entirely surrounded by development and as a wooded and scrubby field adds wildlife diversity and climate resilience to the Tavistock landscape.
